Welcome to the Orthopaedic Clinic

The Orthopaedic Outpatient department manages patients with acute and chronic orthopaedic injuries or conditions, and provides a follow up service. We provide treatment for approximately 25,000 patients per annum.

We are able to offer our patients care and treatment of a very high quality. The nurses have expertise in patient assessment, fracture management, casting and splinting. The department is fortunate to be affiliated with the Wellington School of Medicine, and has the expertise of some of the most eminent orthopaedic surgeons in New Zealand.

We are open 7 days per week, including statutory holidays. Our hours of opening are 8am – 9.30pm Monday to Friday, 9am – 5.30pm weekends and public holidays.

Professional nursing practice in Orthopaedic Clinic is:

Orthopaedic Clinic is located in the Emergency Building of Wellington Hospital, on Level 3. The Orthopaedic Clinic can be accessed from the main corridor, through any pedestrian entrance to the hospital. Alternatively we have external access through the CSB/Orthopaedic Clinic entrance off Mein Street between 8am and 4pm Monday to Friday only.

This is a purpose built facility which offers functionality, privacy and a pleasant environment for both patients and staff. Our department has 4 main areas, a patient waiting area, acute treatment/plaster rooms, a clinic area including offices and exam rooms. Personal belongings should be stored in a locker in the staff room. The clinic **direct dial number is 3855952**, this is the number to call if you are unwell or taking leave from your placement.

There are 17 orthopaedic surgeons who work in Orthopaedic Clinic, with 10 registrars, 1 SHO and 4 house surgeons. The registrars rotate every 6 months, and the house surgeons every 3 months. We also have Hand Therapists attending Mr Chou's and Mr Rowan's clinic as well as physiotherapists at a number of our fracture follow up clinics.

Your Preceptor/ Clinical Liaison Nurse

What Happens

You will be allocated to work with a nurse each day. This will be written in the allocation book. At the beginning of each day you should meet with this nurse. It is **your** responsibility to ensure the nurse you are working with is aware of your objectives for the day/week. You must provide evaluations and/or other paperwork to your preceptor in a timely fashion (i.e. not on the due date!!). You preceptor will not complete any evaluations if you give it to them on your last days in the unit.

To assist you in achieving your learning objectives, there is a large amount of literature and reference material, for you to use. We hope this will be an interesting and productive time for you.

If you are in doubt, overwhelmed, confused or uncomfortable – **speak up**. There is no such thing as a silly question.

Expectations of the Student Nurse

The shifts in the Orthopaedic clinic are Monday to Friday:

Morning	: 0800hrs – 1630 hrs
Afternoon	: 1300 hrs – 2130 hrs

We have a few expectations of student nurses working in the Orthopaedic Clinic:

- It is expected that you arrive on time for your shift and if you are going to be late or you are unwell and cannot come to call the unit on 04 3855952
- You must complete the full shift that you are allocated to work if you are unable to do so please discuss this with your nurse, preceptor or nurse educator. A lot of learning occurs at quiet times in the unit!!
- It is important for your preceptor or the nurse you are working with that he/she is aware of your objectives
- Due to infection control a clean uniform must be worn, long hair must be tied back and cardigans must not be worn when working in the floor
- If you are not achieving your objective please see your preceptor (before the last week in the unit)
- Please ensure all documentation you need to complete for the polytechnic/university is accomplished before the last days in the unit your preceptor will **not** complete any paper that is given to him or her if it is given in the last days of your placement
- To be responsible and accountable for your actions while practicing in the Orthopaedic clinic

- To work as part of a multi-disciplinary team under the supervision of the designated registered nurse
- To work as part of a multi-disciplinary team under the supervision of the designated registered nurse
- To behave in a professional and responsible manner.
- To provide patient care and service in accordance with the values of Orthopaedic Clinic
- To be self-directed in seeking knowledge and development of skills
- To communicate appropriately with staff and patients
