The Emergency Department Observation Unit (EDOU)

Capital Coast Health is responsible for the delivery of core health services to the people of Wellington; its' suburbs, the Porirua Basin and the Kapiti Coast.

The EDOU is a 10 bed unit adjacent to the Emergency Department. Five beds are for observation patients from ED and five beds are for assessment patients we pull straight from the waiting room. We also have ED's 7 bed Minor Care Zone. So two thirds of our work is now ED work.

The major goal of the unit will be to discharge up to 80% of patients' home within 24 hours.

Professional nursing practice is committed to the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi: protection, partnership and self-determination. Each person is a reflection of a particular culture, environment and life experiences. The nursing care each person receives responds to these differences.

This orientation package is provided to help familiarise you with the unit, its standards and its procedures. We encourage you to make full use of the units learning resources. A preceptorship program is provided to supervise your practice and to assist you in learning the knowledge and skills needed in an acute environment.

We believe in providing a supportive environment in which to work and learn. We hope your time here with us is both interesting and challenging.

Your Preceptor

You will be allocated one main preceptor; this preceptor will be responsible for helping you completing your objectives. We will endeavor to ensure that you mainly work with this preceptor; however, due to shift work this is not always possible. It is **your** responsibility to ensure the nurse you are working with is aware of your objectives for the day/week. You must provide evaluations and/or other paperwork to your preceptor in a timely fashion (i.e. not on the due date!!). You preceptor will not complete any evaluations if you give it to them on your last days in the unit.

If you have any concerns or questions do not hesitate to contact the Nurse Educator.

Expectations of the Student Nurse while in EDOU

The EDOU team consists of a team of registered nurses, a nurse educator and an Associate Charge Nurse Manager. The EDOU is under the umbrella of the Department of Emergency Medicine.

Morning shift 0700 - 1530

Afternoon shift 1445 – 2315 (except Thursday 1430 for teaching)

Night shift 2245 - 0715

Students administering medications (oral or intravenous) must always do so under direct supervision of an RN from the start to the finish of the procedure. Please see Student Policy in Intravenous Therapy & Cannulation Resource Manual.

- We have a few expectations of student nurses working in the EDOU:
- It is expected that you arrive on time for your shift and if you are going to be late or you are unwell and cannot come to call the unit on 3855487
- You must complete the full shift that you are allocated to work if you are unable to do so please discuss this with your nurse, preceptor or nurse educator. A lot of learning occurs at quiet times in the unit!!
- It is important for your preceptor or the nurse you are working with that he/she is aware of your objectives
- Due to infection control a clean uniform must be worn, long hair must be tied back and cardigans must not be worn when working on the floor
- If you are not achieving your objective please see the educator or your preceptor (before the last week in the unit)
- Please ensure all documentation you need to complete for the polytechnic/university is accomplished before the last days in the unit your preceptor will **not** complete any paper that is given to him or her if it is given in the last days of your placement

Safety Measures in the EDOU

— What to do in the event of a cardiac arrest

If you discover a collapsed patient, push the red emergency bell above each bed. Ring 777 if no-one else can or if you are asked to. State clearly that it is a cardiac arrest in EDOU, bed-space XX

— What to do in the event of a fire

If you discover a fire or smoke, immediately tell other staff. Follow the directions of the nurse in charge

Ensure you are familiar with the flip-cardex hanging beside the patient note slots.

Ensure you know where automatic fire alarms and fire hoses are situated.

Common Presentations to EDOU

Common presentations to EDOU include:

 UTI (Urinary tract Infection) or pyelonephritis
— Deliberate Self Harm/overdose
— Chest pain (low risk under ED)
— Arrhythmias
 Minor injuries needing observation
 Older people needing MDT assessment or AHOP team
— Post ictal
 Waiting for further investigations
— Renal Colic
— Back pain
— Headache
— Minor care injuries/illnesses
